September is Hunger Action Month

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics highlighted that as of March 2023, **groceries are**11.3% more expensive than they were a year ago. Locally, the food pantry community is ringing the alarm that they are in crisis. In response, the Marion Institute's Southcoast Food Policy Council (SFPC) has reinstated its weekly emergency food access meetings, just like we did throughout the pandemic.



Our food pantry leaders are reporting an **increased demand for food**, while often running out of product before they have served all their guests. In March 2023, Project Bread disclosed that **19.2% of Massachusetts households are food insecure**. Food insecurity can look like skipping meals, not knowing where your next meal will come from, relying on less nutritious, inexpensive foods, or having to choose between buying food or paying bills. Food insecurity, or more accurately, nutrition insecurity is a hidden epidemic that affects 1 in 3 MA residents, with children being especially impacted.
